Following is a speech by the Permanent Secretary for Commerce and Economic Development (Commerce, Industry and Tourism), Miss Yvonne Choi, at the "MEHK - Hong Kong Converging Possibilities" launch ceremony today (November 13):

Later this month, the Chief Executive will attend a MEHK event in London as part of our global push to attract more MICE events here.

Ladies and gentlemen, I would be remiss if I do not pay a special tribute to the environment the ceremony is held in today. The Jockey Club Creative Arts Centre is the ideal venue for the launch of the MEHK Office.

Converting an old industrial building into an arts and heritage centre is a great idea, and reflects the creativity and potential of our city and its people.

I am confident the MEHK Office will also help find creative solutions for maximising our potential as a location of choice for MICE events.
